Environment



Bridget, Rebecca, Scott and Max, plus their dogs, worked hard to plant 130 saplings recently at Stokesley Primary School to create a new hedge. The remaining saplings from The Woodland Trust will be planted, when possible, to extend the existing copse of trees in the school grounds. Thanks to Anne for putting together a suggested planting plan.

Several members of the group are exploring adopting sections of the verges along the A172 between Treebridge roundabout and Ingleby Arncliffe to increase the wildflowers. The first step is to undertake a survey of wildflowers to see what is there already. If you know of any patches of wildflowers that are worth investigating, please can you email Bridget Holmstrom so that when the current restrictions are lifted they can be explored further.

Energy

Food

Free seed stall

Wendy and Jenny, from the Food group, ran a small stall in the March Stokesley Farmers' Market giving away small packets of home-grown seed to encourage people to do Grow Your Own. There was a lot of interest leading hopefully to more seeds being sown this year and several new members for the group. Donations on the stall of just over £30 will help fund future projects.



Transport

The group supported Great Ayton Parish Council and Stokesley Town Council in applying for funding to support bus services in the area. We are waiting to hear the outcome of the applications and also the application for funding, on behalf of the group, to the Northern Community and Customer Fund for creating a multi-user route on Station Road in Great Ayton.

Information has been prepared by the Transport group to help make the case for funding the planned cycleway between Stokesley and Great Ayton and details of a Lift Sharing App will be added to our website when lift sharing becomes possible again.

On a positive note, the footpath on Station Road in Great Ayton is due to be re-surfaced following the group highlighting the poor state of the path to Great Ayton Parish Council who then raised the issue with North Yorkshire County Council.

'The Uninhabitable Earth - a Story of the Future' by David Wallace Wells

"You asked for details on books that might be of interest. I have just finished reading 'The Uninhabitable Earth - a Story of the Future' by David Wallace Wells

It is an extremely well researched book that draws its material from a wider range of scientific material on climate change - almost 60 pages of notes and references - but it does it in a way which is accessible. I feel I can't do any better in terms of a review than to refer to the assessment by Mark O'Connell of the Guardian 'Enough to induce an honest to god panic attacka brutal portrait of climate change and our future lives on earth... extremely effective in shaking the reader out of complacency To read the Uninhabitable Earth is to understand the collapse of the distinction between alarmism and plain realism."

'Feeding Britain, Our Food Problems and How to Fix Them' by Tim Lang

"We currently do not have a national food policy. This book is a call for British Food Democracy. Lang says it is time we stopped telling others how to improve their food systems when we are not doing this for our own. Major challenges are known to be facing the UK food system: climate change and ecosystems stress, public ill-health caused by diet, food poverty caused by social inequality, leading millions to depend on food handouts, and more. We have no political response getting a grip.

Th National Food Strategy Review led by Henry Dimbleby has been set up to investigate the intensive farming practices that have caused serious damage to the environment, and the food related disease costing the NHS billions and drastically harming the lives of millions.
